PASTOR'S CORNER

In today's Gospel, we see Jesus sending out his followers in pairs from town to town; blessing households with peace, curing the sick, and proclaiming the kingdom of God is at hand. But before he tells them to do all of that, he tells them to 'Carry no money bag, no sack, no sandals.'

We can debate why Jesus told them not to take these particular things with them. And yet what seems quite clear is that, if we want to be faithful disciples, if we want to preach Jesus' message in an authentic way, there are some things we need to leave behind, some things we simply can't take with us if we truly want to do the Lord's work. Like space exploration, we need to travel light.

And so, what should we leave behind? What can we not allow ourselves to get weighed down by?

Maybe we need to leave behind our own agendas; and do our best to make sure that the things we're working towards are things Jesus would work towards too.

Maybe we need to leave behind our egos; and see doing the Lord's work as an end in itself, not as an accomplishment for ourselves.

Maybe we need to leave behind our need to always be right; and stop seeing the sharing of our faith as some sort of argument to be won.

Maybe we need to leave behind our need to be recognized or liked; and instead choose to do things for God even if not a single soul ever knows about it.

Maybe we need to leave behind our need to be comfortable; and have the courage to do the risky thing, the scary thing, the unpopular thing, the thing that has nothing in it for us.

The list could go on and on. We have to figure out for ourselves what might be holding us back and weighing us down from truly doing what God is asking of us. Every grudge, every fear, every moment of indecision or laziness, every act of selfishness, every impure motive, and yes, every sin matters.

The infinite force that can change not only individual lives, but the world as a whole is nothing short of the Spirit of the Living God dwelling within each of us. And it is a power beyond our wildest imagination. But because of the freedom God gives us, because of that precious gift, we, through a myriad of things, can actually weigh down and hold back that power from propelling us as far as God intends.

And so that's the challenge we face this day. May each of us have the faith and wisdom and courage to let go of the countless things we need to let go of, let ourselves be stripped of everything that can hold us back from going where the Lord wants us to go, and thereby let God reach incredible heights of love, mercy, compassion, and generosity through us. THINGS TO PONDER

We are an exceptional people. What makes us exceptional is that God has called us to be His own. At weekday masses this week, we hear from the book of the prophet Hosea. His life experience and his faithless wife parallel the relationship between God and the nation of Israel. It echoes to this day in the faithless behavior of our society, our world, in response to the love of God.

All that makes us exceptional is to be present to our God in humility and faith. God is love and He calls us to truth, to obedience and to love. Our country is not a theocracy but was founded upon some religious principles. In many ways, then, our nation has been exceptional throughout its history. Recent court decisions seem to highlight a developed trend from exceptionalism toward exemptionalism over the course of many decades.

Possession of weapons considered to be unlawful for most ... the connected and the elite to be held exempt in some jurisdictions. The fearfulness in encountering an unexpected pregnancy obscures the heart to be open to all options. In a desperate response, some have chosen or assisted in even infanticide as a further exemption.

In so many ways over so many decades society has drawn us away from faithfulness to God and His law of love. The beauty is that just as Hosea's wife returned to him, just as Israel was restored to loving and serving the Lord in faithfulness, we too, individually, and collectively, are not without hope as we turn our minds, our hearts and our wills to the love and mind of God.

Let us move away from exemptionalism and restore exceptionalism by the mercy and grace of God.



Bishop Schlert Issues Statement on Supreme Court Abortion Decision

The following is a statement by Bishop Alfred A. Schlert regarding the U.S. Supreme Court decision on the Dobbs v. Jackson Women's Health Organization case:

"In light of the Supreme Court decision on Dobbs, we are reminded that since God is the author of all life, all human life must be protected and respected at every stage, especially the most defenseless."

"The past half century has consisted of dark days of human and judicial error that manipulated the Constitution to allow humans to play the role of the Creator and the arbiter of who deserves to live. I commend the justices for their courageous willingness to reexamine the right to terminate a life."

"We see how the abortion issue has coarsened our society and civil discourse. This will continue as the issue returns to the states. Now is a time of renewed prayer and engagement with the legislative process to continue the work reinforced by today's decision."

"To those who have procured an abortion in the past or are contemplating one, our opposition to abortion is not an opposition to you, but rather a call to embrace you. The Diocese of Allentown stands ready to assist you in a spirit of love, mercy, charity, and compassion, through our prayers and the services of Catholic Charities and its partner agencies."


